Message from the President



I want to start off this message by wishing everybody a Happy Canada Day. A couple of days ago I saw a survey of all the cities in the world ranked by what were the most 'livable cities' and guess what, Canada has three of the top ten spots in that listing. Vancouver, Calgary and I believe Toronto was #8. I think that routinely Canada and its people always fare well in any kind of worldwide survey like this so I for one am so proud to be a

Canadian! OK, I know I don't exactly sound Canadian but for the record I have been here for 48 years so I think that counts for something.

I'm also proud to be living in Pickering and am pleased that the City of Pickering invited our club to participate in their Canada Day celebrations. So please stop by and say hello at the PROBUS Pickering Lakeside table at the Canada Day celebrations at Esplanade Park today from 12 noon to 5pm.

We are continuing with our zero COVID restrictions policy on meetings and so far so good - as far as I know we have had zero COVID problems as a result. We had 100 members out for the May meeting and 120 for the June one and all other in-person meetings fill up very quickly. Some of you wear masks and that is totally OK as our club will continue to keep your health and safety as a top priority. I hope our new found freedom can last.

Over the last few days, 66 membership reminders were sent out by our Wild Apricot membership system. These were sent to our Charter Members as it is exactly three and a half

years since our club was chartered. In November, 2018 we had an 'Information Meeting' in the Rec Center which was well received and attended. That prompted us to apply to become an official club and so on December 18, 2018 we received our 'Charter'. It was signed by then PROBUS Canada President, Bob Boone, and it formalized our standing as Club #264 in PROBUS Canada. Then on January 16th 2019, we had our very first meeting as a Chartered club. After that meeting we had 88 members and so those became our 'Charter Members'. The fact that we still have 66 of these Charter Members remaining in our club is, I think, a tribute to all the volunteers who have kept our club so vibrant during this period - over 2 years of which were impacted by the pandemic restrictions. I sincerely hope to see most of these 66 people renew as they are the foundation of our club. By the way, if you are wondering why we have that half year in there, it is because at the start of the pandemic we gave our members an extra 6 months free membership to cover for the non-activity at that time.

Back to being proud of being a Canadian. When I landed in Ottawa almost exactly 48 years I got a job with the Canadian Government and when I left that job a year later my colleagues, who were no doubt totally frustrated by my English accent, gave me a gift - a book called 'Canajan, eh!'. It was written by a Mark Orkin in 1973 and it talks about how easy it is to spot a Canadian by how they speak. It is a dictionary of sorts and here are just a few examples from that book that I think are still so relevant today.

- Berrie a town in Untario about 50 miles north of Tronna
- Jogga fee study of the earth's features, populations, climb it, etc.
- Em Pee a member of the Housa Comms; & EmPeePee a member of the per vinshull legislature

Here is what the 'Collings English Dictionary' says about 'eh': Canadian (used as a filler, equivalent to "you know" or "you see"). I was on my way, eh, when I realized I had forgotten to call you. Imagine that, the very English "Collins Dictionary" recognizes 'eh' as being uniquely Canadian.


I still have the 'Canajan, eh' book by the way if anybody wants to borrow it - but needless to say, it did not help me that much.

This month our speaker will be Barbara Dixon. Barbara is an award-winning public speaker, historian, documentary film producer and writer who has entertained, educated, and enlightened audiences for over twenty-five years. Barbara's vision is to educate Canadians about the phenomenal work carried out by women across the nation whose invaluable contribution helped win the Second World War. She is committed to ensuring that Canada's 'bomb girls' are honoured and commemorated by fellow Canadians and has authored 2 books on this subject:



'Bomb Girls: Trading Aprons for Ammo' is a comprehensive, historical record of Canada's biggest WWII munitions plant ("GECO") employing over 21,000 citizens predominantly women, who courageously worked with high explosives around the clock over its four-year history. The book offers a unique, intimate, and extraordinary glimpse into the lives and hearts of these dedicated Canadians. In-person interviews with the women who risked their lives every time they stepped onto the "clean side" of the plant lend a personal, distinctive perspective to the book.



'Bomb Girls: United for Peace' recounts one hundred and one never-before-told biographies garnered from rare one-on-one interviews with surviving bomb girls or from painstaking research provided by family members, company documents, government records and archival fonds. From domestic abuse to miscarriages, from murder to meeting royalty, the book offers a culturally-rich, one-of-a-kind resource that will appeal to women of all ages, students, educators, historians, and World War II aficionados.


