


Message from the President January 2023

For our January meeting we welcome Lianne Harris. Lianne has presented to us before, about the Roaring Twenties', and is back by popular demand.



Interesting Info About New Year's

January 1st has been considered the start of the new year since the reign of Julius Caesar. The Senate at the time decided to adopt the Egyptian calendar which was a simple one of 365 days with an extra day every fourth year in order to make up for the drift of the vernal equinox. The Julian calendar was named after the god Janus who had two faces, one looking ahead to the future and the other looking back to the past.



New Year is celebrated first in the Republic of Kiribati, a series of islands and atolls in the Central Pacific. Kiribati is the only country in the world to be situated in all four cardinal hemispheres. The last place to celebrate New Year is American Samoa which is located in the South Pacific Ocean.

The first gathering at Times Square on New Year's Eve was held in 1904 with over 200,000 in attendance. This inaugural bash commemorated the official opening of the new headquarters of The New York Times The newspaper's owner successfully lobbied the city to rename Longace Square to Times Square. The stroke of midnight was celebrated with a display of fireworks until 1907 when fireworks were banned in the square.

The 'Time' ball has been dropped in Times Square every year, beginning in 1907, except 1942 and 1943 due to the wartime "dimout" of lights in New York City. Instead, people partied but offered a moment of silence on New Year's Eve.

Gaetano Alberto (Guy) Lombardo, who was born in London, Ontario in 1902 was the first person to host the broadcast of the Times Square New Year's Eve Party. Before Dick Clark, the Times Square New Year's Eve Party was hosted by Guy Lombardo and the Royal Canadians.

The famous song Auld Lang Syne, written in 1788, is attributed to the national poet of Scotland, Robert Burns. It was the Canadian-born bandleader Guy Lombardo that helped make "Auld Lang Syne" a New Year's Eve tradition in North America. His band, the Royal Canadians, played the song at the turn of the new year in a series of popular radio (and later television) broadcasts that began on December 31, 1929, and continued for more than 30 years.

In 1972, Dick Clark began his famous live New Year's Rockin' Eve Special filmed in Time Square. The show was such a success that it became a New Year's Eve staple with Ryan Seacrest taking over the reins in 2005.

When the ball drops and the clock strikes midnight in Times Square, a blizzard of confetti blankets the sky filled with the hopes and dreams of people around the world. The confetti is referred to as "wishfetti". People are encouraged to write down their wishes for the new year on pieces of confetti either online or in person in Times Square at a spot aptly named Wishing Wall on the Broadway Plaza between 43rd and 47th Street. According to the organizers of the event "Submitting a confetti wish gives everyone the ability to be a part of the magic that happens on New Year's Eve in Times Square". At least 3,000 pounds of confetti is dropped in Times Square each year.

In 1981, red light bulbs and a green stem converted the New Year's Eve Ball into an apple for the "I Love New York" marketing campaign that referred to New York as "The Big Apple". In 1988, the ball returned to its classic look.

The tradition of a kiss at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve originated with the Scottish. The tradition travelled around the world and came to America with the arrival of German immigrants in the 1800s. One early printed mention in 1863 of German revelers notes that "hearty kisses" were passed around at the stroke of midnight.

The tradition of champagne on New Year's Eve is hard to credit, but since the day of Julius Caesar, the arrival of the new year has been celebrated with drinks and parties. Although all kinds of alcohol were used to celebrate these special days, by the early 1900's, champagne became the traditional drink on New Year's Eve. It is estimated that over 360 million glasses of champagne or sparkling wine are consumed on New Year's Eve alone.

The Times Square Ball is located in New York City's Times Square. Located on the roof of One Times Square, the ball is a prominent part of the New Year's Eve celebration in Times Square. The first 'Time' ball was dropped on New Year's Eve in 1907, after a ban was made on fireworks for the celebration. The ball's design has been updated four times to reflect improvements in lighting technology. The original ball was 5 feet in diameter, constructed from wood and iron, and illuminated with 100 incandescent light bulbs. By contrast, the current ball is 12 feet in diameter, and uses over 32,000 LED lamps. Since 1999-2000, the ball has featured an outer surface consisting of triangular panels manufactured by Waterford Crystal, which contain inscriptions representing a yearly theme. To date, there has been 9 different themes. The design theme for 2023 is 'Gift of Love'. Past themes have included 'Gift of Wisdom, Gift of Happiness,

Gift of Goodwill, Gift of Harmon, Gift of Serenity, Gift of Kindness, Gift of Wonder and Gift of Fortitude. For more information, you can check out www.timessguareball.net.
